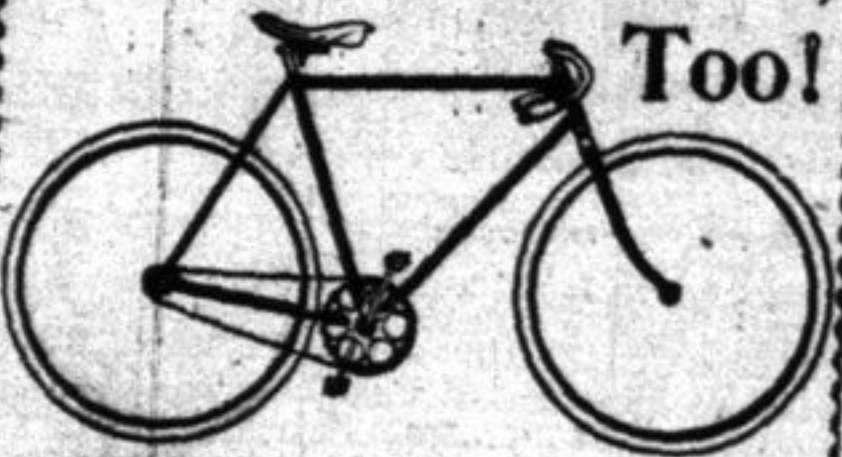
REPUBLICAN CAUCUS.

We are glad to be able to say that as we go to press the men repairing the intake pipe, at the pumping station went out this morning with the last piece of pipe, and unless some unforeseen and unexpected accident happens the job will be completed this afternoon so that hence-forth our people will be able to use the lake water as of old, as the supplies come from far out in the lake. We congratulate every one connected with this difficult and important job.

The Presbyterian folks are building an annex to their church. Just what it is for we can't divine. It can't be a rear vestibule, for there is no outside opening. It may be a kitchen, but it looks more like a baptistry. It is large enough, with a good deep basement, all securely bricked in. What confirms us in this opinion is the fact that they have put in a pipe from the street water mains so as to have "hudata polla"—many waters—as John had in baptizing at Enon. We congratulate our Presbyterian friends with keeping abreast the age.

We respectfully in our own, and in behalf of many others, tax-payers but not merchants or grocers, who have spoken to us of the matter, ask the city council to abate the nuisance, for that is what it amounts to, of these street peddlers or vendors of fruits and pea nuts. This is a refined, quiet and high toned residence city and we want this matter of licensing such men stopped at once. It is a nuisance to the all-the-year around residents, who come out here for or e thing to get rid of such things as they suffer in Chicago. We have a clean orderly, quiet city and we don't want men going up and down our streets yelling out at the top of their voices "oranges" etc. Our own dealers,

pay taxes and can supply all our citizens with these things. Abate these nuisances at once; the people are demanding it.

We have just received a twenty page pamphlet of the expenses of the village of Ludlow, Vt, for the year ending April 27, 1898. The population of the village is a trifle over 1000, more compact than ours. On street and walks, for they build their concrete walks out of the general fund, they expended \$1628.25, of which \$1066.66 was for walks; street lighting \$278.79; fire department \$192.30; police department \$2500; city collector, clerk and superintendent \$2500. Their water system is supplied by a mountain brook with sufficient natural head for all purposes, with about 7 miles of pipe, 22,200 feet of 4 inch, and only 440 of 12 inch; 223 water takers 26 fine hydrants, 1400 feet good hose, one steam fire engine; water rents \$3,153. one meter, total expenditure last year on system \$3115.54. From this printed report every citizen can see where every dollar of the city's money goes to.
