

Ali the property belonged to the government, and each inhabitant, by his labor, contributed to increase the common store and drew therefrom what he needed for his wants; and, necessities provided for, he desired no more. Passion, malice, envy and hatred were unknown, and all members of this republic were free from covetousness and ambition. So different was this ideal picture of society than man had ever known that its name gave a new word to language, and all projects for improvement which are obviously impracticable have come to be called utopian .- Detroit Free Press.
