The Review of Reviews sends us quite a list of opinions of "Notable Readers." On looking over the list of noted men whose opinions are quoted we fail to find our own. Well come to think we don't read the Review of Reviews, but we do read the Literary Digest, one of the very best periodicals in the English language; it is the very cream of the American, or the world's periodical press.

Miss Margaret A. Badger died in Boston last week Friday. She was born in 1826, and had taught in the public schools of that city since 1855, or for a term of forty three years consecutively. That beats the record of the dean of our faculty, Miss Barlow, who has been here about a dozen years. All this shows that there are some women yet who rather devote their lives and energies to teaching children than supporting some inefficient man.

The door bell of our judicial sanctuary rang the other evening and on opening it a youngly man stood there and said: "Judge, I want to sign the pledge to stop drinking for one year." We invited him in, wrote a brief but strong pledge, read it to him and he signed it, we added our name as witness and he put it in his pocket to remind him when tempted of his plighted honor. We told him to stand firm. And then he surprised us by offering to pay us for our services, but we declined of course and told him that for any help we could render a weak, tried or tempted fellow man like that, struggling to redeem himself we should make no charge. Won't the men and women in Highland Park who believe in prayer remember the man who "signed the pledge" when they go into their closets?

**CHAMBERLAIN'S RESPONSE**

The News is evidently read abroad. Last Friday's issue contained an article on the Anglo-Saxon, or English speaking races alliance, as one of the results of this Hispano-American war. That same evening, the Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, in premier Salisbury's cabinet, went down to Birmingham, his home, and delivered a strong, uncompromising address in favor of this Anglo-Saxon alliance. They used to rely on that visionary "balance of power" theory in Europe to preserve the peace. Since Disraeli's, Lord Beaconsfield's wonderful achievements at the Congress of Berlin in 1878, it has been the "concert of Europe." But that is now defunct, if it ever had any life, and England sees France, and naturally Italy influenced by the old Latin race traditions, with Russia, Germany and Austria, as we pointed out last week, influenced by their monarchial absolutism, all practically combining against her, because as we said, England makes for freedom's holy cause, even though she has to fight for it. Hence this Anglo-Saxon alliance, a practical union of all the English speaking nations and

races of the world for peace, freedom and progress, or in other words, for the good of the world, blessings on mankind, not for territorial aggrandisements at home or abroad.

The News congratulates Mr. Chamberlain on what all in this wild and woolly west town "horse sense," for as ex-President Cleveland once suggested, it is not a theory, but a situation, a stubborn fact or series of them which confronts Great Britain and the United States. The Boston Transcript well says "Let us make no mistake about the sentiment of foreign government. The United States from the nature of the case, has no well wishers in official or diplomatic Europe, except Great Britain." No formal treaty may yet be drawn, as was the case between the European powers at Berlin in 1878, but though unwritten, it will be, like the English constitution binding and definite and will also command the respect of the world.

While such an Anglo-Saxon alliance will command respect for both England and the United States, it will go far toward compelling the peace of Europe, and if Japan, the youngest of the great world powers comes into this alliance, it will have a mighty influence in shaping affairs in the far east. This alliance then is not mere sentiment, it is a mighty and significant fact, and may have a wonderful influence in re-outlining the map of some portions of the globe, beside securing freedom, peace and prosperity.

**UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP FREE.**

An examination of applicants for free State Scholarships in the University of Illinois will be held in the office of the County Superintendent of schools, Waukegan, Friday, June 3, and Saturday, June 4.

These scholarships confer the right to receive four years of instruction in any of the regular under-graduate courses, at one of the best State Universities in America.

Girls as well as boys are eligible, but all must have been residents of the county for a year preceding such examination. They must also be at least sixteen years of age.
