#### WAR REVENUE.

House Bill-Taxes Provided for by the Measure.

Washington, June 6 .- With no evidence of excitement and without incident worth of special note, but with manifestations of deep interest, the war revenue measure was passed by the senate Saturday evening at 7:05 e'clock. The bill was under consideration eight hours Saturday. A score or more of attempts were made to amend it, but in only three or four instances were the attempts successful. Particular effort was made to amend the bond provision of the measure, but it was futile in

every instance. The most notable amendment made to the measure Saturday was that offered by Senator Tillman (dem., S. C.) placing a duty of ten cents a pound on all tea imported into the United States. The amendment created no debate and was adopted by a vote of 38 to 32. It is calculated by the senate experts that the duty, if it be finally enacted into law, will raise at least \$10,000,000 a year, and probably more. A strong effort was made by Senator Morgan to incorporate the income tax fea-


