The friends of Mr. Shultz who, with his wife are spending the summer at "The Maples" with the Ash-ton's, were shocked a day or two since to receive word that his only brother, who with his wife and two children and maid, had sailed for Europe on the ill fated French steamship, La Bourgogne, had all perished. When the ship was found to be sinking, the

life boats were lowered, Mr. Shultz and his family securely placed in one of them just ready to pull away when the ship's smoke stack fell over upon their life boat crashing through it and sending all its passengers to the bottom. Mr. Shultz was bound up in his brother and as fond of the children as though they were his own. He and his wife left for New York Wednesday night, to be gone a week or more, after which they will return to the Park for the balance of the season.

**SUICIDE.**

Yesterday morning the body of an unknown man was found on the railroad track about half a mile south of Ravinia station. Later investigations showed that he had friends on Division street in Chicago and they were notified after the inquest, which was held by Dr. F. C. Knight, County Coroner, yesterday afternoon. The body was brought to the Park and placed in the freight house where the inquest was held. The Doctor had a jury of the following: W. F. Edwards, G. H. McNabb, James H. Duffy, Simon P. Leesch, John Rudolph and Frank Kirby. The evidence which was rather meagre of the engineer of the fatal train and Michael J. Joyce, the section boss at Glencoe was to the effect that it was a case of deliberate suicide, as everything seemed to show that. We have known just such cases. It was a sad, significant sight.

**WHAT IT COST.**

Now that the brick paving of St. Johns avenue from Central to Laurel is completed and every one is interested in it, we give an itemized bill of costs. The section paved is 500 feet long and the street is 40 feet wide. The total cost of this 500 feet is about \$4,300. As the distance paved is a little less than one-tenth of a mile, the cost per mile of such paving would be over \$43,000, as much as to build a railroad in a hilly country. The length of this piece of street is 500 feet and it is 40 feet wide, that is it. The granite substratum nearly a foot thick under the brick is included in the estimate for the brick work.
