### REPUBLICAN CO. CONVENTION.

A Republican County Convention will be held at the town hall in the village of Libertyville, Lake County Illinois, on Saturday, September 10, A. D. 1898, at 1:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following county offices of said Lake County, viz: County Judge, County Clerk, Sheriff, County Treasurer and County Superintendent of Schools, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention. It having been resolved at a meeting of the County Central Committee that each voting precinct in the county be declared a primary district, and that primary elections or caucuses be called for each of said primary districts, it is therefore recommended that primary elections or caucuses be called for each primary district in said county on Friday, September 9, 1898, at the usual hour. The representation for each primary district will be one delegate for each 27 votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for the Republican candidate for President in 1896. The several primary districts will thus be entitled to send delegates to said County Convention, as follows, to-wit:—

### SIDEWALK ORDINANCE.

For Cement Sidewalk on West side of Sheridan Road, formerly called Port Clinton Avenue.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois: SECTION 1. That a sidewalk be constructed on the west side of Sheridan Road, formerly called Port Clinton Avenue immediately in front of the following described lots or parcels of land:

Lot one (1) and north fifteen (15) feet of lot two (2) in block eighteen (18).

All in the city of Highland Park, county of Lake and State of Illinois, and that the whole cost thereof be levied upon such lots or parcels of land in proportion to their frontage upon such sidewalk.

SEC. 2. Said sidewalk shall be constructed under the supervision of the foreman of street work, and subject to his approval, as follows: Said sidewalk shall be a cement sidewalk; the width of said walk to be five feet. The inner edge of said walk to be twenty-two inches from the lot line and parallel therewith, the inner and outer edges of said walk to be parallel. A trench shall first be excavated to a depth of sixteen inches below the grade of the finished walk, the inner edge of said trench to be sixteen inches from the lot line and parallel therewith, said trench to be six feet wide. In the trench prepared as above there shall be laid clean beach sand or clean coal cinders to a depth of eleven and one-half inches, which shall be well padded and tamped down. In this trench, when filled as aforesaid, shall be laid a concrete foundation three and one-half inches thick and five feet in width. The inner edge of said concrete shall be twenty-two inches from the lot line and parallel therewith. Said concrete to be composed of gravel or fine crushed stone, either or both, mixed with imported English or German Portland cement, or a cement equal in kind and quality, in the proportion of one to seven, which shall be well and thoroughly tamped down. Upon this shall be laid a finished one inch thick, composed of imported Portland cement, or a cement equal in kind and quality, and clean torpedo sand in equal parts, mixed in water and trowelled off to a smooth finished surface.

At all wagon crossings intersecting said walk the same shall be constructed in manner as herein provided, except that the top finish of said walk shall be finished with longitudinal lines four inches apart and the quantity of concrete shall be five and one-half inches thick. Along side of the outer edge of said trench a ditch shall be dug six inches wide and six inches deep in which shall be laid three-inch common porous drain tile for the entire length of said walk, said drain tile to be so laid as to have a proper fall to carry off water, and to be connected at the end with the street gutter, or with any convenient catch-basin; the joints of said tile to be covered with tar paper. Said ditch for said tile shall be filled in with sand, cinders or gravel to the depth of eighteen inches, and then to the surface with the excavated earth. The spaces between the edges of said sidewalk when completed and the edges of said trench shall be filled in with sand flush to the surface of the ground. The joints of said sidewalk shall be fixed by the engineer employed by said city, and all persons desiring the grade shall apply to the said engineer for the same.

SEC. 3. All owners of lots or parcels of land, aforesaid, are hereby required to construct said sidewalk, in front of their respective land within thirty days after the date of publishing this ordinance; and in default thereof, said materials to be furnished and sidewalk to be constructed by said city.

SEC. 4. Said foreman of street work shall certify to a bill of the cost of said sidewalk, constructed by said city, showing in separate items the cost of grading, materials, laying down and supervision, and file it in the office of the city clerk, together with a list of the lots or parcels of land touching upon the line of the said sidewalk, the name of the owners thereof, and their frontage on said sidewalk.

SEC. 5. The city collector is hereby designated the officer to collect the special tax herein provided, and to whom the warrants for the same shall be directed.

SEC. 6. The city clerk shall comply with the provisions of "An act to provide additional means for the construction of sidewalks in cities, towns and villages," in force in Illinois, July 1st, A. D. 1875; and if any land is delinquent after return of warrant by said city collector, then said clerk shall make report of all such special tax, in writing, to the county treasurer and ex-officio county collector, prior to April 1st, 1898, as required by said act.
