EX-GOV. MATTHEWS DEAD.

**Paralysis Causes the Decease of One
of Indiana's Favorite Sons
—His Career.**

Lafayette, Ind., Aug. 29.—Ex-Gov.
Claude Matthews had a second stroke
of paralysis on Saturday afternoon
and expired at 6:30 Sunday morning.
He was conscious from Friday morn-
ing until the second stroke occurred
and recognized his family and friends,
but was speechless.

Gov. Matthews was born in Bath
county, Ky., December 14, 1845. He left Ken-
tucky in 1868 and settled in Vermillion
county, Ind., where he had a farm of 2,000
acres. He organized the Indiana Short
Horn Breeders' association, and was one of
the founders of the national association of
Short Horn Cattle Breeders of the United
States and Canada.

Although always having a strong pre-
dilection for politics, Mr. Matthews rarely
sought office. He served a term in the leg-
islature in 1876. In 1890 he was nominated
and elected secretary of state, and in 1892
he was chosen governor.

In 1896 the friends of Mr. Matthews re-
solved to make him a conspicuous can-
didate for the democratic presidential
nomination. The state convention was en-
thusiastically in favor of his nomination
by the national democratic convention
which met in Chicago in July, 1896.

On January 7, 1898, he married Martha
R. Whitcomb, daughter of the late James
Whitcomb, who was governor of Indiana
from 1843 to 1849, and was afterward United
States senator from this state.]

CZAR IS FOR PEACE.

**He Wants an International Confer-
ence Held to Secure Universal
Good Feeling.**

St. Petersburg, Aug. 29.—By order
of Emperor Nicholas, Count Muravieff,
the foreign minister, handed to the
foreign diplomats at St. Petersburg a
note declaring that the maintenance
of peace and the reduction of the ex-
cessive armaments now crushing all
nations is the ideal for which all gov-
ernments ought to strive.

The czar considers the present mo-
ment favorable for the inauguration
of a movement looking to this end, and
invites the powers to take part in an in-
ternational conference as a means of
thus insuring real and lasting peace
and terminating the progressive in-
crease of armament.

Insurgents Ready to Disband.

Santiago de Cuba, Aug. 29.—Gen. Cas-
tillo, who has been in consultation
with Gen. Lawton, expresses the op-
inion that the disbandment of the
Cubans can be effected without trouble.

He says the hostility of the Cubans
growing out of the refusal of the
Americans to permit joint military
occupation of the conquered territory,
with the Cuban flag floating over
the palace, beside the stars and stripes,
is disappearing, and under the advice
of cool heads the scheme of making
an armed demand for their alleged
rights has been abandoned.

Admiral Schley in Washington.

Washington, Aug. 27.—Rear Ad-
miral Winfield S. Schley reached Wash-
ington at 4:10 o'clock Friday afternoon
over the Pennsylvania railroad. He
was cheered all along the trip, and
when he reached the city he was given
a hearty welcome by the multitude
that was waiting for his arrival. In
the afternoon he called on the presi-
dent, who gave him a most cordial re-
ception. During his visit they dis-
cussed the work of the Puerto Rican
commission, of which he is a member.

Died Penniless and Alone.

New York, Aug. 29.—A beautiful 18-
year-old girl, who died of heart dis-
ease in a flat in this city was identified
by Baron P. De Lange, an Austrian
banker, as Wanda von Speno Boden-
baroness and viscountess of Spierenbergh
of Austria, and heiress to
\$4,000,000. She had eloped from
home with a young man who robbed
her of her jewelry and money and
then deserted her.

Appeal by Aguinaldo.

Manila, Aug. 29.—Aguinaldo has de-
cided to send delegates to Paris to
present the cause of the insurgents to
the members of the peace commission.
They will also make known to Europe
and America the nature of the rebel-
lion against Spanish authority and the
claims of the insurgents for recogni-
tion in the future government of the
Philippines.

Thinks Jamaica Will Come In.

Berlin, Aug. 29.—The Post prophe-
sies that Jamaica will be soon under
the stars and stripes. Then, it says,
the small Antilles under the French,
Dutch and Danish will gravitate to
Washington whether their home gov-
ernments like it or not.

Soldiers Killed.

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 29.—In a
wreck near here on the Louisville &
Nashville road Peter Farley and Frank
Glennon, of the Sixty-ninth New York
volunteers, were killed; J. J. Manning
was fatally and four others were seri-
ously injured.

Six Persons Injured.

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 27.—Six
persons, one of whom may die, were
injured in the explosion of nearly a
ton of fireworks in the manufacturing
plant of George W. Porter.

To Fight October 1.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 27.—It has been
definitely decided that the Corbett-
McCoy battle will take place at
Cheektowaga on October 1.
