WORTH.**

The Sidney (Ia.) Herald tells
of an instance of appreciation at
the hands of a local college which
has warmed its editor's heart and
made his nearby contemporaries
jealous. Tabor College has hereto-
fore given its printing to the
Herald when it would meet the
prices of large city offices. Now,
however, under a change of policy,
the Herald is to have all of the
college printing, for reasons given
by its president, as follows: "I
take this view: that every issue of
our home paper is advertisement
for the town and the college, of
greater importance for us to main-
tain than an advertisement in any
other form without it; and the
least we can do is to turn over to
its publishers our entire printing
for them to execute at fair prices.
No matter if some of it is outside
their capacity, let them have the
order and give the work a home
imprint. They are attracting the
attention of the public to the pro-
gress of the college, and are de-
serving of fair treatment at our
hands." It is this feeling that
should actuate every man in his
dealings with his home paper, up-
