Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Welch will take a trip through Indiana during the next two weeks.

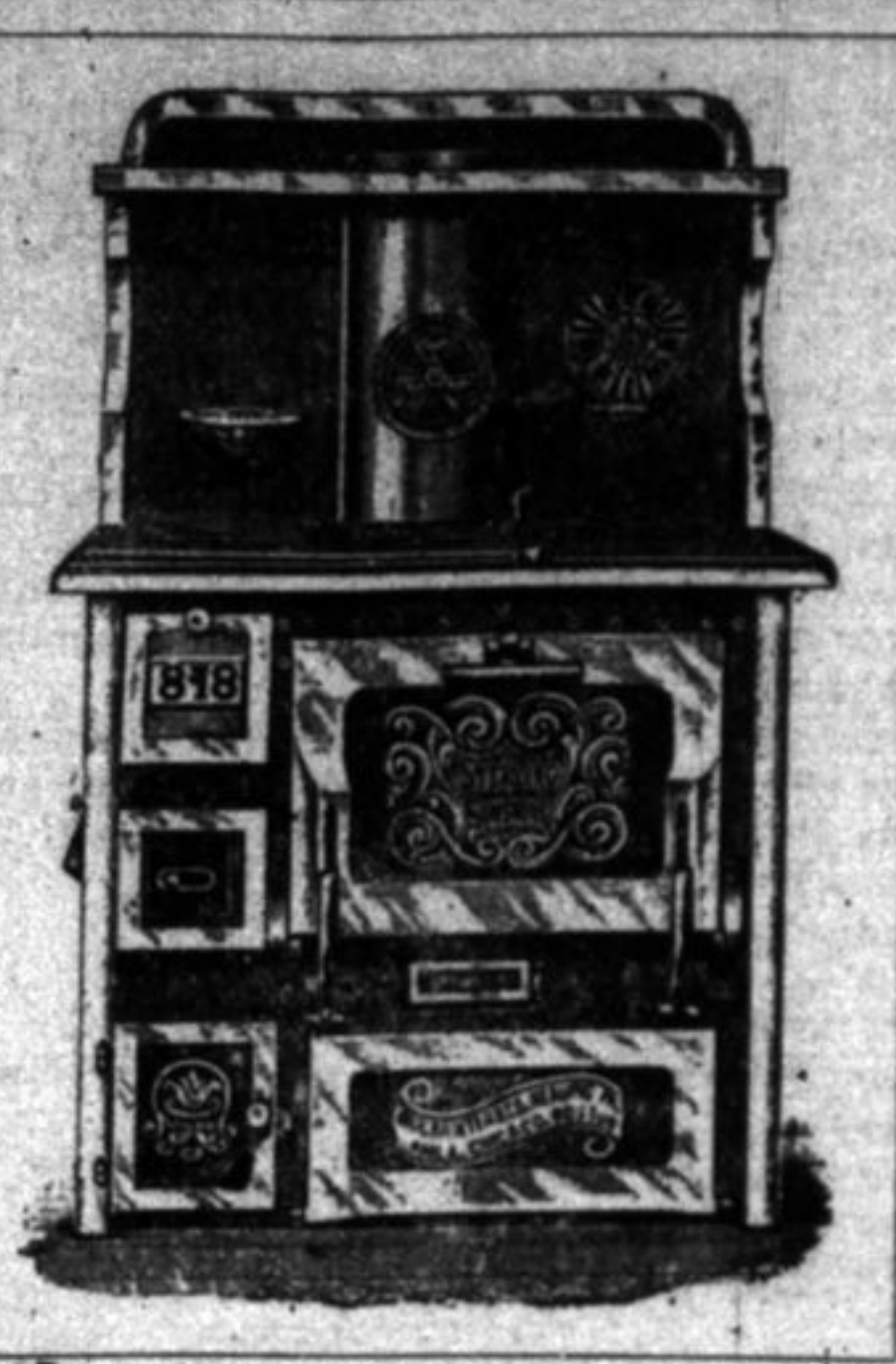
John Hickey is very ill with typhoid fever and has been removed to the Presbyterian hospital, Chicago.
