

beauty, comprising 25 acres, with splendid oak, elm and maple trees.

Over \$40,000 has been expended on buildings and grounds. The club has 6,500 feet of water mains, including 2,500 feet of six-foot city mains, with hydrants for fire protection at cottages, stable and clubhouse. Ample stable facilities; a cottage for servants; a log cabin for club-maker and professional. All buildings are lighted by electricity. The club owns its own omnibus line.

The third hole, "The Bramble," 310 yards over a complete tangle of hawthorne, grape vines, hazel and wild rose bushes due west to the southwest corner of the course. From tee to "The Bramble" 50 yards, and balls must be driven over or dropped without teeing and penalty of stroke and distance. Some of the best players, including the professionals, proceed to fill "The Bramble" with balls, although a clean drive is easily over.

The fourth hole, "Sunset," due north

The seventh hole, "Log Cabin," 370 yards due east along fence and woodland with hazard on right, making straight drive necessary to pass hazard of trees on right, fence on left; cop and bunker in front of green 50 yards; sand bunker at far edge of green; fence on left, trees to right.

The eighth hole, "The Apple Tree," 390 yards along grass, hazard of small wooded spot to right and apple tree midway; green on top of hill.

Ninth and "Home" hole, 400 yards

The Course: The first tee is just south of the clubhouse on a natural elevation of 50 feet above the links proper—a perfect spot for a display and a good "drive."

The first hole, "The Spring," 400 yards due west; green protected by cop and sand bunker 30 yards from hole.

The second hole, "Through-the-Woods," 170 yards over a cop and sand bunker at edge of green. A straight drive absolutely necessary from 20 to 25 yards wide or serious trouble. Trees both sides.

along fence and woodland 500 yards. Two hundred and fifty yards from tee, cop and sand bunker, and long grass at ends. Twenty yards of green sand bunker, on approaching sand bunker at right, fence at left and fence beyond it.

The fifth hole, "The Burroak," 335 yards, large cop and sand bunker, 95 yards from tee driving southeast. Green protected by long grass.

The sixth hole, "Straight-away," 365 yards due north over sand bunker, 80 yards from tee. Green protected by cop and sand bunker.

due east, cop and bunker 40 yards from green.
