You will see from the above statement that our receipts were decreas ed during the year nearly \$2000, while with our increase in number of inmates the expenses were practically the same. We have carefully examined the books and accounts of the secretary and treasurer and find them absolutely correct. We find cash balance, Dec. 31, 1898; \$432.32 Of this amount there is cash advanced by the secretary and treasurer and bills payable \$347.50. Actual cash on hand to the credit of the Home \$85.76. Our relations to the officers and managers of the Home during the past year have been most pleasant and no complaints have been made by any of the inmates.
