CHANGE AT THE HOME.

The board of managers of the
Railway Employes Home at Idle-
wild met in their annual session on
Tuesday. As a result of their meet-
ing the Home will have a new man-
ager, and Dr. Ingalls, the founder
of the institution and for years in
direct charge of its affairs, will be
succeeded by Mrs. T. B. Watson, of
Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

There were present at the meeting
the following officers representing
the various railway relief and broth-
erhood organizations: Hon. L. S.
Coffin, Fort Dodge, Ia.; Geo. Goding,
Chicago; Mrs. T. B. Watson, Cedar
Rapids, Ia.; Dr. J. C. Valentine,
Chicago; Wm. Kilpatrick, Chicago;
Lewis Ziegenfus, Clinton, Ia.; Mrs.
W. E. Hoyt, Antioch, Ill.; W. C.
Ronald, Galesburg, Ill.; E. Ingalls,
Elgin, Ill.; T. M. Arnold, Peoria,
Ill.; Mrs. George Stofft, Chicago.
Business of vital importance was
transacted, chief of which was the
election of officers.

The officers for '98 were re-elected
with the exception of the combined
office of sec., treas., manager and
physician which had heretofore been
held by our well known and esteem-
ed townsman, Dr. F. M. Ingalls. He
originated this institution ten years
ago, and has been acting in business
and professional circles in Highland
Park for the past four years. The
severance of his connection with this
institution will be a matter of regret to
all who have come in contact with him
in his official connection. The follow-
ing report of the board of trustees is
highly commendable to the business
management of the retiring officer.

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To the president, officers and mem-
bers of the board of managers of the
Home for Aged and Disabled Rail-
way Men of America, we your board
of trustees beg leave to submit our
report for the year 1898. The total
receipts from all sources during the
year were \$6,667.56
Balance cash on hand Jan.
1, 1898 65.24
\$6,732.80

Of this amount we received as a lega-
cy \$1063.85. Actual receipts from

the Brotherhoods and usual sources
of revenue \$5538.47.

Receipts for 1897 were	\$7,530.35
" " 1898 "	5,538.47
Decrease	\$1,991.88
Total disbursements for the year 1898 were	\$6,299.48
Of this sum was paid for improvements	48.05

The actual running expens- es being	\$6,251.43
During 1898 total amount disbursed	\$8,275.70
Paid for improvements for the year	\$2,125.76
Paid for actual running ex- penses	\$6,149.94

You will see from the above state-
ment that our receipts were dereas-
ed during the year nearly \$2000,
while with our increase in number
of inmates the expenses were practi-
cally the same. We have carefully
examined the books and accounts of
the secretary and treasurer and find
them absolutely correct. We find
cash balance, Dec. 31, 1898, \$432.32
Of this amount there is cash advanc-
ed by the secretary and treasurer
and bills payable \$347.50. Actual
cash on hand to the credit of the
Home \$85.76. Our relations to the
officers and managers of the Home
during the past year have been most
pleasant and no complaints have been
made by any of the inmates.
