MYERS NABBED.

The Chicago police have arrested upon a charge of burglary Thomas Myers, a much wanted former resident of Highwood, and the leading spirit in a gang whose depredations left this part of the state several thousands of dollars poorer than when he first appeared upon the scene. As will be remembered Myers and a companion were boarding with Mrs. Carpenter, who conducted what was known as the Fort Sheridan Hotel on the premises now occupied by the offices of the electric railway. Many robberies and depredations were being committed all along the North Shore and suspicion finally being directed to Myers and his gang. Marshal Gordon of Highwood worked diligently on the case and at last made a raid upon the premises. Myers and a companion escaped in their stocking feet, but Mrs. Carpenter and her servant were arrested. Stolen property was found concealed in all parts of the building and was removed to the Fort Sheridan town hall where some of it was identified. Several thousand dollars worth of valuables still await the rightful owners. Myers successfully eluded all efforts put forth to arrest him upon the warrants sworn out by Marshal Gordon. Both he and Mrs. Carpenter were indicted and the latter is now out on bond awaiting trial in March. Vague reports came of Myers' presence in various places, but the police were unable to apprehend him. The recent Antioch bank robbery was thought by many to be of Myers' planning.

His arrest, made in Chicago on Wednesday, occurred in connection with a general round-up of desperate crooks made in hopes of securing one or more of the Antioch robbers. Sheriff Griffin and States Atty. Heydecker were called to Chicago and are said to have positively identified Myers, who is to be turned over to the Lake County authorities in a few days. Marshal Gordon and

other officers prominently identified with detective work in the case are highly elated to learn of the capture of one of the most dangerous and desperate men who ever operated on North Shore.
