## DEATH OF MRS, ALEX. SCOTT.

On Thursday afternoon about three o'clock occoured the death of Caroline, beloved wife of Mr. Alexander Scott, assistant suppoint a lent of the Highland Park water works. Mrs. Scott was born at Deerfield in Oct. 3, 1841; the year after her parents, the Millens, came to Lake County from central New York. She whereat the youngest of twelve children, of whom but three new survive. These are Mr. H. J. Millen of Highland Park, Mrs. Watson Allison of Chicago and Mrs. Cordelia Goodwin of Kankakee. The Millen family are numbered among the pioneers of Lake County and their members and connections have played an important part in the development of this vicinity. Before her first marriage Miss Millen taught school near Deerfield, for a short period, and afterwards conducted the school in the old log Catholic church, which was for years a landmark near Highland Park. She was in fact the last teacher in this historic edifice. In 1860. Miss Millen was married to Isaac Palmetier of Deerfield. Two child. ren; Elmer and Luella, blessed this union and both have remained to cheer her declining years. In 1879 the decedent married Alexander Scott of Highland Park, one of the most respected citizens of our city. One daughter, May, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Scott.

For a number of years prior to her death the decedert was an acute sufferer from heart trouble, and the end came as a direct result of this malady aggravated by an attack of la grippe. Beside the immediate circle of near relatives who mourn the departure of Mrs. Scott there are the Palmetier, Millen, Galloway and Scott families who are scattered all over Lake County and about Winthrop, Iowa.

The funeral services will be held on Sunday at one o'clock at the late home of the decedent, 77 Green st., Highland Park. The services will be conducted by Rev. Pfanstiehl and the burial will be in the family plot at Deerfield.
