AN ORDINANCE CREATING A PUBLIC DRIVEWAY, TO BE USED FOR PLEASURE DRIVING ONLY, IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That the street now named Sheridan Road in said city under an ordinance of the city council of said city duly passed on the 9th day of February, 1892, extending from the northerly line of Central avenue to the southerly line of Broadway, and formerly called Post Clinton avenue, be, and it is hereby established as a public driveway, to be used for pleasure driving only, the said street being hereby created a pleasure driveway by virtue of, and in accordance with the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, entitled, "An act to provide for pleasure driveways in incorporated cities, towns and villages," approved and in force March 27th, 1889, a petition signed by the owners of the requisite frontage along said street, between said points, having been duly presented to the city council, petitioning that said street be created a pleasure driveway, which petition is hereby approved.

SECTION 2. That hereafter said Sheridan Road, as above described, shall not be used by traffic teams, traffic vehicles, nor for the hauling of burdens, commodities, freight, express, nor shall the same be used by lumber wagons, drays, dumping carts, delivery wagons, express wagons, or trucks, and any person violating any of the provisions of this section, or who shall use said Sheridan Road for any purpose other than a pleasure driveway, shall be fined in a sum of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense; provided, however, that this ordinance shall not apply to any persons using said driveway for a distance thereof not to exceed one block, for access to property fronting on said Sheridan Road, such persons coming however from an intersecting street nearest said point of access, nor to the use of said street by teams or wagons actually engaged in the repairing or improving of the same, nor to sprinkling wagons actually engaged in sprinkling said Road.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
