

A DELIGHTFUL MUSICAL.

The program rendered in the Club rooms on Wednesday evening, before a large and appreciative audience was a decided treat to all present, and Mrs. Annette R. Jones for whose direction the entertainment was in a large measure dependent for its success, is to be congratulated.

From the opening number, a violin rendition by Mr. George R. Jones with a piano accompaniment by Mrs. Jones—to the final number of the evening's program, the

audience displayed a high appreciation of the talent and artistic ability of the different musicians.

The "Persian Garden Quartette" composed of Mrs. Ada Sheffield, soprano, Mrs. Rita J. Shank, contralto, Mr. Henry Sheffield, tenor, and Mr. Carl Christ, barytone, are deserving of the highest praise for their magnificent work. Their ensemble work was unusually good, their voices being beautifully balanced, displaying highly artistic finish and dramatic interpretation. Each member of the quartette sang very intelligently and their magnetism was evidenced by the rapt attention given them by the audience. How perfectly in tune the artists sang was perhaps most noticeably apparent in the last quartette, where, for a few measures the singers were unaccompanied by the piano.

Mrs. Sheffield's voice is a clear and brilliant soprano, wonderfully pure in quality, and absolutely true. Her solos were given with great dramatic power. Mrs. Shank's contralto is very rich and full, and in quality indeed beautiful. The trembling, or vibrato, common to many barytones is happily absent from Mr. Carl

Christ's voice, for his voice is unusually smooth and shows his absolute control of it. Mr. Henry Sheffield's sweet tenor voice is truly beautiful in quality. The "Persian Garden" program is extremely difficult of rendition, and the quartette of Wednesday evening are to be congratulated for the wonderful musical temperament they evinced in their beautiful work.
