James Dewey, a well known and highly respected citizen, died Sat-

urday night shortly after midnight. Mr. Dewey has been a resident of Lake Forest for over twenty years. He was a rare example of integrity, industry and kindly courtesy to all, a public spirited man whose place cannot be filled. For many years Mr. Dewey was a familiar figure among the business men on South Water street. A year ago his health failed and he was forced to give up business and remain at home. In July he submitted to a painful surgical operation with the hope of saving his life. He survived the operation and for a time seemed to be on a fair way to recovery, and when cold weather set in, he was well enough to go south, where he hoped to entirely regain his wonted strength. But his trip was a failure and a disappointment, for scarcely had he arrived at his destination when he was stricken by a fatal illness and returned to his home to die. He passed from life peacefully and happily as an innocent, beautiful child might, surrounded by his family and friends. He leaves a widow and three children, who mourn his loss in common with hosts of friends and neighbors. The funeral took place from St Mary's church Tuesday morning. Requiem Mass was sung, with an offertory solo by Mrs. Greene. Father O'Reilly, who had been for many years the pastor, friend and spiritual advisor of the deceased, preached a most touching funeral sermon. The interment took place immediately after mass at Lake Forest cemetery. And so closed a most beautiful and edifying life.

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
