**SETTLEMENT WITH THE ELECTRIC.**

At the council meeting Thursday evening Vice-President Frost, Treasurer Mauck and Engineer Garrity were present and had a conference with the council lasting nearly three hours before the council convened in their chamber. The fruit of the conference was seen in an ordinance which was presented and passed under a suspension of the regular order. All the councilmen, except Mr. Poole, were present, and President Orde was in the chair. The vote was unanimous, and both parties are happy over the amicable settlement.

The railway gets the twenty-five feet right-of-way, and the village a twenty-five foot pavement in Green Bay Road, cement gutters and curbs being included in this width. If the Green Bay Road improvement is not completed when the railway is ready to be operated—and it is fully understood it cannot be, and ought not if good work is to be done—the company is to be allowed to open their road on the terms proposed by them: They turning over to the village the contractor's bond and paying into the village treasury the unpaid balance then existing. Vigorous prosecution of the work and early completion of the electric road through Glencoe is now the immediate outlook.
