

GETS THERE ON TIME.

Boston, Mass., June 23.—As the Montreal express pulled into the North station this morning Henry D. Lloyd stepped off the train, took a carriage for Cambridge and in half an hour had made an end of a 10,000 mile race against time.

Just a month ago today Mr. Lloyd who for the past six months had been in New Zealand making a study of the economic conditions of the island, received a cablegram from his wife in Chicago informing him that the day set for class day at Harvard was June 23, and on that day, if he wished to participate in the pleasures of his boy's graduation, he must be in Cambridge.

It was pretty short notice, but Mr. Lloyd is used to travel and on that very day he started for Sydney where he arrived May 24. The steamer Warrimoo left Sydney the same day for Vancouver, and, boarding her, he had nothing to do but wait until Canada was reached. At Vancouver a delay of twenty-four hours was necessary, but last Sunday night he took a train for Montreal, coming through on the Canadian Pacific.
