Officer Gordon Shot.

Policeman James Gordon of Lake Forest lies at the Alice Home hospital badly bruised and with a bullet wound in his head as a result of a fight he had Wednesday morning while arresting Henry Lancaster, a farmer three miles west of here. Lancaster and his brother John are also at the hospital, Henry shot through the groin and John with his left leg shattered by a bullet. The one may die and the other will lose his limb.

Gordon accompanied by Charles Enmark, drove out to the farm with a warrant for Henry Lancaster, who had assaulted Enmark's brother. He was told the man wanted was not at home, and while talking with a member of the family he was encountered by John Lancaster, who ordered him off the place. Gordon arrested him and tried to handcuff him. Trouble followed and the policeman felled his prisoner. The young man's aged father called for help and with a hired man went to the rescue and a hot battle was being waged between Gordon and Enmark on one side and the Lancaster family on the other, when Henry, who had been hiding in the house, came to the door and fired at the officer. The latter was struck, but on regaining consciousness struggled with the two men for his revolver, but they were not able to get it. Getting his hand free he shot both brothers. Gordon and Enmark carried Henry Lancaster to the wagon and started for Lake Forest, going direct to the hospital, where their wounds were dressed.

At the hour of going to press all concerned were improving. John Lancaster, it was stated, may lose his leg. Gordon is suffering more from the severe pounding at the hands of the Lancaster family than from the bullet wound he received. Mayor Edward F. Gorton says the Lancaster family will be prosecuted for shooting and beating the policeman, and, if possible landed in the penitentiary.

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
