Will Highland Park Have Gas?

Within the past few days petitions have been presented to many of our citizens, asking them to sign frontage consents for the city council to pass an ordinance granting permission to D. S. McMullen and W. Irving Osborne, of Evanston, to install gas in Highland Park. The gentlemen asking for the ordinance are two of the three owners of the Waukegan Gas Light and Fuel Co., and it is understood that if the ordinance is granted, the Waukegan Gas Co. is behind it.

This is a move which promises one of the greatest benefits our city has yet received. There is reason why the residents of Highland Park should not have the best and enjoy the same conveniences and luxuries as the residents of other cities. All our citizens have felt the need of gas, especially for fuel purposes, and with this want supplied no other city on the North Shore furnishes the attractions and advantages for a home equal to Highland Park.

A visit to Waukegan will show that these gentlemen have built a most modern, complete and desirable plant there, and one capable of supplying a city of 50,000 inhabitants; the works, with nine miles of pipes, were completed January 1st, 1899, and the citizens there have extended such support and encouragement that the company is this fall laying three miles more pipe and preparing itself to meet at once the wants of the people. The quality of gas furnished is the best, and the price charged there very reasonable, being \$1.25 per thousand feet, with a discount of 10 cents per thousand for illumination and 25 cents per thousand for fuel. A comparison of prices shows this to be as low as that in our large cities, and much lower than in cities of Waukegan's size.

We are assured that if proper encouragement is extended, High-land Park will have gas and have it promptly; that the best of service will be furnished at a price much less than is given to citizens of cities in Illinois of less than 10,000 in-habitants, and we therefore hope the frontage consents will be freely given, and that the Mayor and Common Council will then grant an ordinance containing conditions and terms for the full protection of the city and all resideuts.
