Testing Motor Gun Chariage.

This morning's Tribune says: The first motor gun carriage made in the United States was received in this city yesterday by Major R. P. Davidson of the National Guard, instructor in the Northwestern Military Academy at Highland Park. The machine was built at Peoria according to plans furnished by Major Davidson.

The Major gave his new war machine a trial spin in the afternoon on the rough ground adjacent to the postoffice in Michigan avenue. The range of the gun, a Colt's "purely automatic," is two miles, with a bullet of twenty-eight caliber. A pull on the trigger explodes the first shell, and the discharges continue at the rate of 480 a minute as long as the trigger is pressed.

"As far as I am aware" said the Major, "this is the first machine of the kind built in this country, although in Europe one on similar lines has been turned out. It has cost to date \$1,200."

Power is furnished by a gasoline engine. With perfect speed conditions, the Major believes he could go thirty-five miles an hour, and counts on making twenty miles over fair country roads. At the latter rate the five gallons of gasoline carried will propel the machine 200 miles.

As it stood yesterday, motor carriage and gun complete weighed 1050 pounds.

On Friday afternoon the grand jury, of the October term, 1899, having concluded its labors, submitted its report to Hon. Charles H. Donnelly, the presiding judge of the circuit court of Lake county. The jury reported as having examined in their deliberations thirty cases and returned twenty-five indictments as true bills. Reported further, that they had examined into the condition and treatment of prisoners, and had found everything as it should be. Recommended that all interior walls of the jail be whitewashed as often as the statutes prescribe and that all metal work be painted white. They further recommend that in addition to making the repairs and improvements already contracted for by the board of supervisors that the third floor of the jail be fitted up in like manner at the earliest possible date.

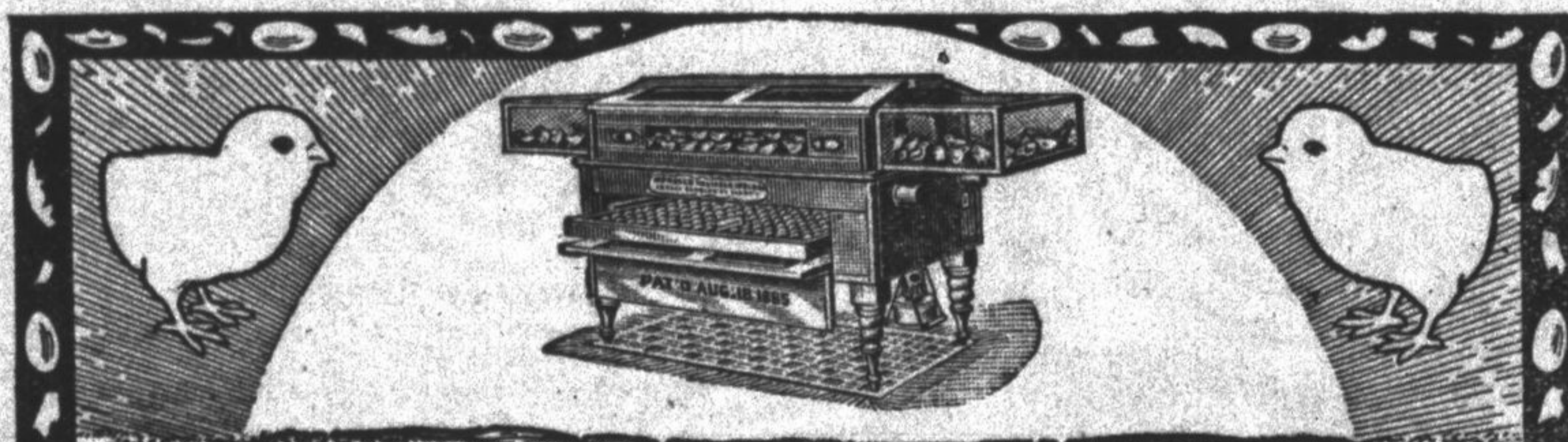
