A meeting of the council was held Monday evening, 23d, to consider whether the acceptance of Thomas H. Murdow's proposition for ground to widen Green Bay road to admit of its proper improvement should not be reconsidered, with a view of acquiring still more ground than was embraced by that settlement, so that the street north of Central avenue along Mr. Murdow's frontage should be uniform with the street north and south. The agreement made at the former meeting was that Mr. Murdow should be paid \$200. A new line making the street full and of uniform width was proposed, by which Mr. Murdow would have given 440 square feet additional, cutting back nine feet into his lot at the narrowest part of the street. No agreement could be reached as to the additional sum that should be paid by the village, so the council contented itself with confirming the agreement previously made. Mr. Murdow presented his deed, and the council passed the necessary ordinance of vacation.

The only other business done was the payment of balance due on his final estimate to C. M. Porter on subway contract; amount, \$608.41.
