

Accident to Walter Clark.

While attempting to "flip" the 5:25 a. m. train Thursday morning Walter Clark, a former newsboy on the Chicago & Northwestern road, was thrown to the ground, sustained a fracture to one of his legs at a point above the knee and was painfully bruised about the head and body. Had it not been for Night Operator Frank Duffy, who from a window in the depot, saw Clark's hat lying on the platform and walked out to investigate, he might have been killed by a freight train which followed close behind the passenger.

Mr. Duffy picked up the victim, who was unconscious and lying between the curbing and rails, and, carrying him into the depot, summoned Dr. Bergen. After setting the limb the doctor had him conveyed to his home on McGovern street.

Since quitting the service of the news company, for whom he sold papers on the road, young Clark had been in the habit of loitering about the depot and jumping on and off trains, and had been repeatedly warned of the danger he incurred in so doing by the employes of the station. As he was unconscious most of the day Thursday the particulars of the affair could not be learned or how he happened at the station at so early an hour.
