Station Agent Pritchard decided during the recent cold snap that Ravinia was too cold for him and so left the station before being checked off by the auditor. Pritchard went to Chicago but was brought back and found to be \$11 short in his cash. He was given but a short time to make up shortage, which he did. It is said he also owed other bills around the village. Mr. John Reifenberg, assistant agent at Winnetka is temporarily in charge of the station.

It is an interesting question to some of just what difference the electric line has made in the business of the Chicago & Northwestern railway. It is quite surprising to note the difference the electric road makes with trip

through Ravinia the Chicago & Northwestern averaged a sale of five tickets per day. Now that the electric line is in operation the number of tickets sold by the Northwestern has somewhat decreased. A conservative estimate is that they now sell but one ticket in fourteen days. Verily the electric road is "gettin' thar."

A mild sensation was caused recently when one morning this week the C. & N. W. waiting room was found cold and both stove doors were missing; it was supposed at first that they had been stolen for old iron, but it was afterwards learned that they had simply been taken in the office to prevent the tramps closing the stove door and burning up too much coal at night.

The Ravinia Sunday school will have a first class Christmas entertainment a week from today. Among other attractions will be a phonograph from the Park. All the members of the school will receive a present, and possibly a few others that attend will receive presents. It was then moved that a vote of thanks be extended to President Boerner for his faithful service to the society for the past two years, and that he be presented with the remaining stationery; carried. There being no further business to transact the society adjourned. Sine die.
