The report of the village treasurer from March 5th to 29th, 1900, was submitted and filed.	
In reply to question by the president the treasurer stated that his annual report would be ready in a few days.	
The clerk's monthly report was submitted, showing:

All of which was turned over to the village treasurer.

The meeting of the council for the expiring year was then adjourned. The new council then met to organize. All present.

After taking the oath of office the members of the council took seats.

On motion of Trustee Baker, seconded by Trustee Curran, the regular order of business was suspended and H. A. DeWindt was elected vice-president of the council.

Trustee Capron spoke of the question being open as to fixing terms of contract with Kenilworth for water supply. On the suggestion of Trustee Brown this was allowed to go over for future consideration.

On motion of Trustee DeWindt, seconded by Trustee Curran, the meeting was adjourned to meet as a committee of the whole next Tuesday evening, April 10th.
