

Rather Chilly Comfort.

Some of the administration, we understand, are congratulating themselves that their defeat does not mean much, and they are trying to draw a little consolation by talking about majorities of 6s and 7s. But sometimes half of the truth is equivalent to a falsehood. Gentlemen, why not tell the whole? The true test as to whether the public are endorsing or turning down the administration is to compare the aldermanic results last Tuesday with the aldermanic results one year ago Tuesday when the administration officials were elected. The figures are as follows:

In other words, last spring's vote stood 310 for the administration and 165 against; this year in the above three wards it stands 203 for the administration and 230 against it, making a total change against the administration of 172, or nearly 40 per cent. This strikes us as rather cold comfort for the administration. But if they can really get any consolation out of it, we would not for the world detract an iota from their happiness. Certainly the figures unmistakably prove that the public are not in a mood to stand any more personal quareling in the council but will demand of their agents strict attention to city interests.

The School Election.

An election for three members of the Board of Education will be held at the Public School building on next Saturday afternoon, Apr. 21; between the hours of 4 and 6 o'clock. The candidates mentioned are, O. H. Mogan—President of the Board. Mrs. Jane E. Smoot. Mr. Fred W. Schumacher.

Mrs. Smoot has just completed her first term on the Board and had decided to retire to private life but her services have been so eminently satisfactory, that the friends of the school would not listen to her declination and she finally yielded to the public demand and consented to allow her name to be used again as a candidate. She should be given a

rousing vote. Mr. Schumacher has been on the Board before and made an efficient member and his election will give the west side of town another representative on the Board. Mr. Morgan is completing his second term as President of the Board.

City Council.

The Wednesday evening meeting was an adjourned one, to hear the report of the special conference committee on the St. Johns avenue improvement matter. It was favorable and pushed the matter along all right, and it ought not to be many weeks before work can begin. If the original contractor fails to do the work new bids will be called for.

The attorney and administration found their former arrangement for a special filter-bed election was illegal, recalled it and passed an ordinance fixing Saturday, May 12th, as election day, and divided the city into two polling districts, one on each side of the track—at the City Building and at the new Library Building.

The sewer "E" ordinance, including a septic or sewerage purifying tank for the west side, was passed; also an order to put in electric lights at the pumping station.
