**A New Invention.**

Samuel Levin has invented a non-refillable bottle. This device which has been sought after by many prominent manufacturers. The liquid can be removed from the bottle in the ordinary way but the bottle cannot be refilled. The device in brief is as follows: A glass cork is inserted in the neck of the bottle and is fastened by little springs into grooves in the neck. At the top of the opening the tube effectually prevents tampering with the valve. Mr. Levin has applied for a patent and expects the papers soon.

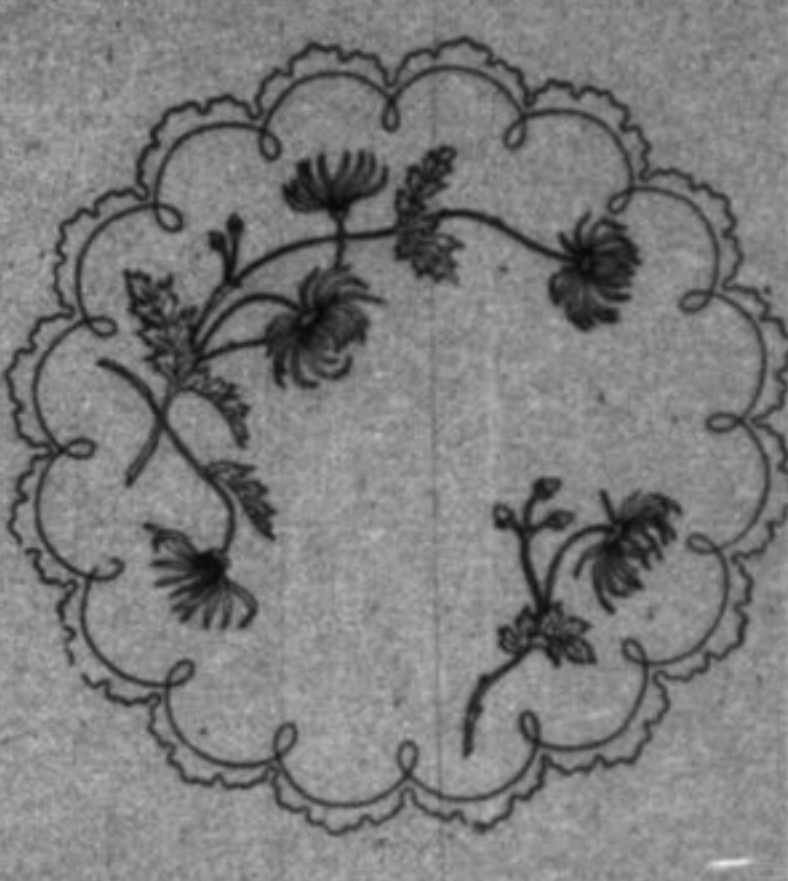

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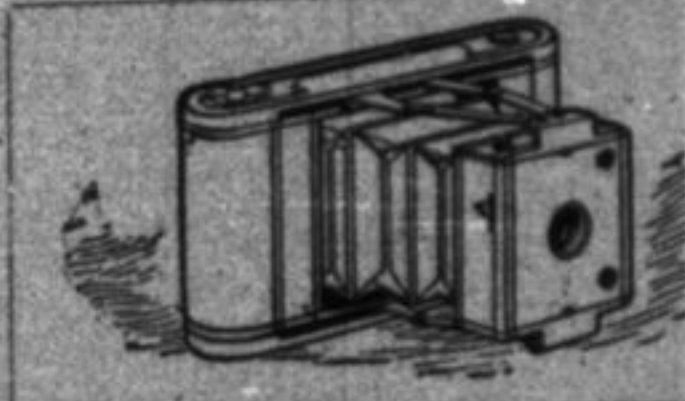
