**Better Electric Car Service**  
Commencing July 5th, through electric cars will run 20 minutes apart, with intervals between Evanston and Winnetka service will be more frequent, and the table easier for the public to follow, than heretofore. The new time cards will be issued by the local agents and in the street bulletins of the company on July 5th.

**Glencoe Council.**  
Adjourned meeting June 20th. All present. Petition of Stone, Winslow, Paepcke and others, praying that a sidewalk be laid along the easterly side of Sheridan Road from the walk of Sylvan Newhall to Stone's north entrance, near the north line, was presented and referred to the committee on streets and Alleys.

Communication from F. W. Copeland, secretary of the Skokie Country club, asking the privilege for members of the club to ride bicycles on sidewalks to and from the club house on streets south of South Avenue and west of railroad tracks, in the streets of that section are not in a suitable condition for bicycle riding, was read.

Clerk instructed to reply in justice to other residents of the village the ordinance regulating use of bicycles on sidewalks would be enforced in that district as well as in other parts of the village.

A proposal from A. S. R. Hardson for sprinkling the street was read and laid on table.  
Bids of Frank Campbell, (\$18), and Charles Faug, (\$15), for furnishing and lettering five bicycle notice sign-boards, were opened and read, and the bid of Mr. Faug accepted.

Chairman of Finance committee reported verbally the approval of the bond of Harding & Nelson contractors; and the President stated that the contract with them had been executed on the part of the village.

Chairman King, from Streets and Alleys, reported two sidewalk ordinances, one for a walk in front of lots 1, 2 and 3, block 21, on west side of Railroad avenue, immediately south of Hawthorne; the other for a walk on westerly side of Bluff street from Hazel to Park street and passed. In regard to the latter, it was understood that Messrs. Eisenberger and Krown would be permitted to build their part of the walk of concrete, and an engineer was requested to furnish grade for the block.

Purchase of another car load of lumber for street work was authorized. Street and Alley committee were directed to have sidewalk on southerly side of Hazel, near intersection of Green Bay road (Dr. Nutt's corner) connected with street crossing.

Chairman Park, from Water committee, reported that the clerk had been authorized to order a street sprinkler from the Winship Manufacturing Company, Racine, at a cost of \$202, and asked the Council to confirm the action of the committee. Confirmed.

The clerk was directed to communicate with the commission appointed by court to assess benefits for condemnation of property on east side of Vernon, between Lincoln and Park, and request them in their roll. Committee on Streets and Alleys were directed to advertise for bids for street sprinkling, village to supply sprinkler and water. The engineer was directed to have connection put in sewer opposite the village park.

The clerk was instructed to notify owners of property abutting on the line of the Hazel avenue sewer that if they desire "house-slave" connections put in opposite the property, they communicate their wishes to the council at once, so that such stubs may be put in immediately. Adjourned on regular meeting, July 3rd.
