Regular monthly meeting July 3. All present but Lundquist.

Letter from W. J. Watson complaining of condition of sidewalk on north side of Harbor street, immediately west of Sheridan road. Clerk stated he was in correspondence with attorney representing owner of property (Notre Dame University) who had given assurance the matter should have immediate attention. Directed to so write Mr. Watson.

Several letters from Hazel avenue property owners regarding placing of T joints in sewer opposite their property were presented. Council adopted order (1) instructing engineer to have such joints placed in front of each lot platted to front on Hazel avenue, or which by reason of conveyance heretofore made now has such frontage, and in front of lots or parts of lots which have access to no other street; (2) to place these joints at such points as may be requested by property owners not embraced by first order, they to advance cost of joints (\$1.10 each) but to acquire no right in joint or sewer by reason of their payment of this cost nor any right to connect with sewer. Copy of orders to be sent each property owner concerned.

Bills were ordered paid aggregating \$1,152.91. Of this \$277.06 was for work on streets; \$108.50 for sprinkling wagon; \$147.70 for Sheridan road and bridge repairs.

Bids for man and team to operate sprinkling wagon were received from Walter & Frauenz and F. Burmeister at \$3.50 per day, and referred to the committee of fire and water.

An ordinance from the committee on streets and alleys for a 3-plank sidewalk on easterly side of Sheridan road from Sylvan Newhall's walk to north village line was passed.

Water committee was instructed to arrange for supplying water free to Gad's Hill Settlement camping temporarily north of the village.

Finance and judiciary committee instructed to report at next meeting terms and conditions on which property owners abutting on main sewer on Hazel avenue may be allowed to connect with it.

Fire and water committee instructed to arrange for housing sprinkling wagon, in barn or otherwise. Adjourned to the 10th.
