**Judge Carter's Decision.**

The question of special assess-  
ments on a street paving contract,  
on Wabash avenue, Chicago, came  
up before Judge Carter a week or  
two since, and he delivered an opin-  
ion that bids fair to become historic.  
He held, that in this case, that the  
city as a whole, should bear a por-  
tion of the expense, while the abut-  
ting property owners should pay the  
balance. His general proposition  
was stated as follows: "If the pav-  
ing of a thoroughfare is of benefit  
to the general public as well as to  
property abutting upon it, the city  
should bear a portion of the expense.

Wabash avenue, at the point de-  
signed, is a business street, in such  
a way or sense that its improvement  
is of business importance to the  
city as well as to the abutting prop-  
erty owners. Therefore, because its  
improvement is a benefit to the bus-  
iness interests of the city, the city  
should help pay its being paved.  
To transfer Judge Carter's decision  
to Highland Park, and apply it here,  
it would mean that a portion of the  
cost of paving our business streets,  
as Central avenue from Frank  
Green's corner to the standpipe, and  
St. Johns from the electric light  
plant on the north to Laurel or  
Highland avenue on the south,  
should be borne by the city, while  
the abutting property should pay  
the balance. An 18 to 25 front feet  
wide street is enough for residence  
sections, for one reason that it gives  
very wide parkway and makes a  
beautiful thoroughfare. But if the  
convenience of the public traffic  
demands a wider street, say 35 to 40  
feet, the public manifestly should  
pay for this extra width, or at least  
a part of it. Thus, the public  
should, in equity, pay a portion of  
the cost of the brick paving on St.  
John's avenue, and should pay a  
portion of the cost of the cedar  
block paving on the west side. Very  
likely this case will go to the su-  
preme court for a final decision,  
but there is no question as to the  
righteousness of Judge Carter's de-  
cision.

**'Rah for Waukegan.**

Our county shire rather a sleepy,  
slow-going town, but when it once  
gets waked up it goes with a vim.  
The utility of golf has just penetra-  
ted the cranium of our neighbor,  
and the disease has struck in" with  
immense force. A club has been or-

to Waukegan in a shorter time than

tiveness, perhaps, to the city. There  
they have beautiful drives, forty-  
three lakes, etc.  
Well, now, when our Bluff City  
friends get a \$4000 club house,  
stables, log cabins, cottages and 18-  
link golf ground, cottages, etc.—we  
will take off our hats and make our  
best bow. Let us call for the encour-  
agement of our friends that it  
takes golf grounds, money, and lots

of both to run a golf enterprise suc-  
cessfully. But Waukegan has plenty  
of those essentials lying around  
loose.

**Special Assessment Notice.**

Notice is hereby given to all persons inter-  
ested, that the city council of the city of High-  
land Park in the county of Lake, state of Illi-  
nois, having ordered the curbing, grading,  
drainage, macadamizing, constructing retaining  
walls, brick cross walks, and otherwise  
improving Sheridan Road from the northerly  
line of Central Avenue to the north line of  
Broadway Avenue (except bridges) in the city  
of Highland Park, county of Lake, State of  
Illinois.

The ordinance for the same being on file in  
the office of the city clerk have applied to the  
county court of Lake county for an assessment  
of the cost of said improvements, according to  
benefits, and an assessment thereof having  
been made and returned to said court the final  
hearing thereon will be had on the 8th day of  
August, A.D. 1900, or as soon thereafter as the
