**City Building Improvements.**

Thomas Morton has been pushing the improvements with great rapidity during the last two or three weeks. First, the city clerk's office has been greatly changed. The vault has been enlarged to double its old capacity by tearing out the south side and enlarging it. The old library room has been connected with the clerk's office by means of a new door through the brick partition wall. Out of this room has been built a toilet room, really taking for this a part of the jail corridor. New stone door and window sills are being put in, new platforms in front of the building and, one by the old library door, greatly improving the outside appearance of the building.

Up stairs the north partition of the council chamber has been removed taking in all that old unused old tank room. Four windows have been cut through the walls, and when completed it will make one large, light, airy, fine room. It is finished off overhead like the old room. This will enable them to set the partition railing back to the entrance door, giving the council more room, besides plenty of room for spectators.

We understand the committee in charge plans this new addition to be used by the police judge for his court room. By putting a desk or table in there it would make a good one. The entire building will be heated by a furnace.

Many people wanted the building enlarged and put into first class shape, but the council seemed to think they had better fix it up as they are doing, so that it would serve for the next ten years or so, when the city would put up a fine new and suitable building throughout, one that would last the city the balance of the new century, and be a credit to the city also. That was not our original view, though we are inclined to think it is pretty sound. We most heartily approve what is being done. It is well and wisely done and we congratulate those in charge of it with their achievements.

**New Route to Union Loop.**

The C. & M. Electric Railway Co. now sells round trip excursion tickets to Wilson avenue in Chicago (the north terminus of the Northwestern Elevated Railway) on the platform of the electric railway passengers take the C., M. & St. P. trolleys which run at short intervals between Evanston and Wilson avenue and connect with the elevated trains. The 10-ride ticket sold by the C., M. & St. P. Co. at Evanston for \$1.00, good between Evanston and Wilson avenue, are also convenient for holders of C. & M. Electric commutation tickets reading to Evanston.

The fare on the elevated railway is 5 cents in either direction between any point on the Union loop in the heart of Chicago. Go to the Chicago parks and stores at small cost in time and money, without the noise and danger on crowded streets.

We have just received from Hon. James H. Davidson, a graduate of the Northwestern Military Academy, a beautiful little booklet, entitled "The Arctic Circle." As we scan its covers, artistic and rough, rugged and towering ice bergs of the northern seas, it is delightfully refreshing atmosphere; and ourselves believe that the temperature has lowered several degrees.

A little biographical sketch of each of the members of the Arctic Club of America has been collected and published for the club by Mr. Rudolf Kersting of New York. We quote from it the sketch of James Wheeler Davidson, who was well known to many of our younger readers when he was a cadet in the Northwestern Military Academy, and we feel sure he has been pleasantly remembered by many of them.

"He was born in Austin, Minn., June 14, 1872, educated at Northwestern Military Academy, Highland Park, Ill.; journalist; U. S. consular representative for the island of Formosa, Japan, decorated, 1895 with the imperial 'Order of the Rising Sun' by his majesty the emperor of Japan; member of Peary Arctic expedition, 1893 and 1894, and 1894 and 1894 ice cap party until incapacitated by frost bite, attached to Formosan expedition (military) under personal command of H. H. Prince Kitashirakawa, 1895, attached South Formosa expedition under command of Lieut. General Baron Nogi, 1895, and only foreign member of scientific exposition to Hotel Tabago island, 1897.
