WAIT FOR THE DISROBING

Strange Fact Revealed That Codfish Feast on Lobsters When the Latter Shed Their Shells.

It is probably news to the majority of people to know that the red rock codfish is a bitter enemy of the lobster that has just crawled out of its shell and is soft and unable to protect himself, says the Lewis (Me.) Journal. During shedding time these lobsters crawl up under projecting rocks where the seaweed and kelp are thick and where they find protected places in which to go through the process of slipping out of their old shells and taking on a new coat of mail, so to speak. For some days after shedding the lobsters are weak and unable to cope with those that will swarm around them. This is the codfish seem intuitively to know and they will swarm around these treats in great numbers and wait the shedders to crawl out.

They would then fall to and devour the helpless crustaceans. This is the lobster fisherman said he had witnessed many times. Shedding season is now practically over, and the shells of the lobster becoming firm and hard and the fully able to take care of themselves.

SWISS NATIONAL INSURANCE

Report Giving Some Interesting Facts About a Proposed Law That Was Recently Defeated.

In a report to the state department Consul General Dubois, at St. Gall, gives some interesting facts about proposed Swiss accident and marine insurance law, says the Washington Post. This law, which was defeated by a two-thirds vote, requires obligatory insurance in case of sickness and accident. The government's share of the expense of the entire premium of the insurance to be 20 per cent., the laborer to bear 60 per cent. The employers were to bear 20 per cent. The proposed law contained various provisions, among which was the insurance clause, which met considerable opposition by the military. The project was defeated time by 195,000 votes. Glarus is the only province out of the 22 which gave a majority in favor of the proposition. There are various reasons which have defeated this measure. In agricultural districts it was considered to be of advantage to industrial centers. Great dissatisfaction was shown by the people in house industries, because it was made compulsory for so many others. Strong opposition was met with among the manufacturers, especially those in the silk industry, because they were of the opinion that the law would be heavier than they were being under the compulsory system at present in existence.

THE ENGLISH VOLUNTEERS.

Fighting Value of the Citizen-Soldier Proved by the War Waged in South Africa.

A recent number of Cassell's Magazine contains an illustrated article in a series upon "The National Defense," dealing specially with the volunteers. The author says: "Anxious to glean a few interesting facts about the volunteer force from someone whose statements and opinions were those of an expert, I hied me to the house of a friend of mine who had for years been in command of one of the most famous of volunteer regiments. He was, as I expected, only too pleased to talk upon his pet subject, for the improving of the volunteer force has been the study of his lifetime. "You see," he began, in answer to a preliminary query of mine relative to the fighting value of the citizen soldier, "the Transvaal war has answered your first question. The city imperial volunteers have given a splendid account of themselves. They represent, undoubtedly, the pick of our fighting material which remained over from the regular army. Scarcely a man amongst them had smelt powder; probably very few had been out of England before in their lives. And yet a war breaks out 6,000 miles away and you find men tumbling over each other in their eagerness to get to the front! That shows the national love of soldiering. You could never obtain such results by conscription. There is not another nation in the world in which you can find a quarter of a million private citizens following the military profession in their leisure hours for the sheer love of the thing. Judging by past results, and taking into consideration the increase in the population during the past few years, I should say that fully 700,000 men would come forward if there were any real danger of invasion and the country called for volunteers."

BOUGHT HER OWN RING.

A CURIOUS MINERAL.

Considerable Attention Attracted to Moldavite Among Geologists of Austria and Bohemia.

A curious mineral called moldavite, or bouterlinstein, has attracted considerable attention among the geologists in Austria and Bohemia. The mineral is in glassy ovals from an inch to an inch and a half long, and is characterized by various markings, which look somewhat like finger impressions, while others form a network of furrows, which seem in part a rough radial arrangement. They have been regarded, by some authors as relics of prehistoric glass manufacture, but this view does not appear to have been sustained, according to the Scientific American. Dr. Suess, the Austrian geologist, finds resemblances between them and meteorites, and the general disposition of students seems to be to regard them as of extra-terrestrial origin. Resemblances have been pointed out between them and the obsidian volcanic bombs found in Australia. In Bohemia the moldavites occur in sandy deposits, which are assigned to the late tertiary or early diluvial period.
