Populations.
The population of the state of Illinois is 4,821,550 making it the third state in the Union. New York with its 7,268,000 and Pennsylvania with 6,301,365 being the two larger states. In 1800 the United States had all told only 5,308,483 or but 486,933 or not quite half a million more than Illinois has to-day. The total for the entire nation now is 76,295,220 or about 14 1/2 times as large as a century ago. At the same rate of increase at the end of this century the country will have over one billion inhabitants.
