A SEAT on the New York Stock Exchange sold the other day for \$46,500. We need a new seat editorial sanetum, but that is more than we want to pay for one. The profits of this paper, though confessedly great, will not warrant such an outlay for that purpose.

In the state of Illinois there are enrolled school children between the ages of 6 and 21 years, 804,857 boys, and 784,038 girls, a total of 1,588,895. Of these 483,752 boys and 475,129 girls are in school, a total of 958,881. Where are the other 630,114. Lots of them have graduated, or are "too big" to go to school, but with all these there are many truant.

WAUKEGAN is enjoying the benefits of a religious revival. The preacher had for his topic on a recent evening "the meaning in Waukegan," and so many men went to see their neighbors that the house was uncomfortably packed.
