tend to occupy the mind of the work-
ing girl and open a channel for the
development and exercise of her
mental faculties will tend to make

position one of credit and satisfac-
tion to herself.

For aside from the prejudice
against domestic service, which un-
doubtedly exists among many work-
ing girls, the position of domestic, in
modern houses which commands from
\$4 to \$6 per week including, in ad-
dition, all living expenses, is far
more to be desired than the position
of the shop girls and factory hands
who receive salaries pitifully inad-
quate for comfortable and whole-
some living.

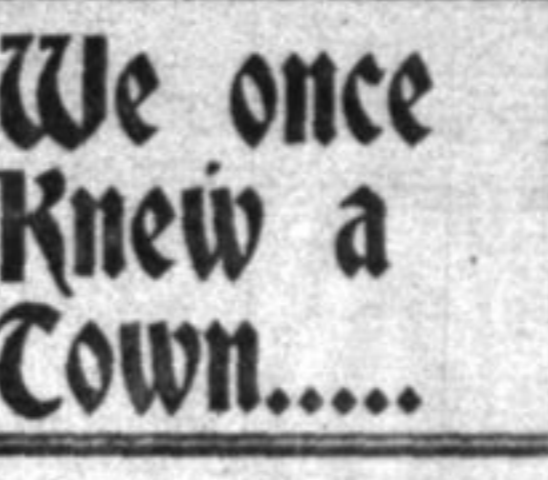
