The caucus seemed to be a one-sided affair. The friends of the successful nominee appeared very good repeaters.

**McGregor's Macadam.**

If McGregor Adams, at present residing in Highland Park, he is doubtless proud of his part in the macadamizing of St. John's avenue. For some reason he was very anxious to have a hand in that job, and he has a chance to see now what a perfect botch he made of it. His desire to have a

hand in it was doubtless with the expectation of making something out of the property owners on that street.

He was reported, at one time, as having offered to furnish the money to the town, and take his chances of getting it out of the tax payers? When some of them on that street asked him if it was a fact he denied it; but circumstances soon after proved very strong circumstantial evidence that he did make the proposition all the same.

**The Caucus.**

The so-called "Tammany" folks held their city caucus Thursday evening in Goldberg's hall. The attendance was large, many going to see the fun. Many have a vivid remembrance of a similar caucus two years ago, when the plan of campaign by beer was inaugurated. That will hardly be repeated, at least so openly this year, for two reasons; first, the beer will perhaps have to be paid for in advance, and second, they won't run the risk of having the election of this ticket declared void because beer was used to secure votes. They have a tolerably well defined fear that if the game should be tried as openly and defiantly as two years ago that some one would "squel" and lose them their victory. And besides, some voters who went for beer two years ago have waked up to the shame and disgrace of the thing and will keep aloof from the beer keg this year.

After two years of such administration as we have had, we confess to some surprise that Daniel Cobb would have the boldness to run again for mayor. We have never regarded him as a positively vicious man; his incompetency lies in the line of his weakness. But in politics a man's weaknesses are as pernicious as positive vices. Look at the officials he has appointed during the last two years; that is enough to condemn any man.

But most astounding of all is the nomination of S. F. Knox for city attorney. This was done for two reasons evidently. First, they could not shake him off. He practically said to them "Put me on there or I'll bust your ticket" and they knew he could do it well enough, and he would have no scruples about it. And second, the difficulty of getting any other candidate. We remember two years ago how one of their well known leaders went up and down the streets at the last, begging other lawyers to go on the ticket as the election of Knox would be a disgrace to the city. And he could not get any one of our numerous attorneys to go on that ticket. That told what honorable men thought of the party ticket.

But Mr. Knox has made a record along three lines, namely, inability to do the work, as in the John Auern case; incompetency, as in the special assessment cases, old Port Clinton and others that failed; and his petty spite work or partisanship as in the Lindblom case where he got hounded down by Judge Donnelly for his conduct in bringing such a suit. But all these things, the extravagance and extra cash, etc, we shall speak of again.

Really it seems as though they had made a ticket to invite defeat. There are some good men on the ticket, some we are persuaded are there without their knowledge or consent, for we cannot believe some men nominated there would go on such a ticket. The caucus was one sided and partisan to make the public believe this was the people's choice. The people nominate by petition, not by such a caucus.
