Death of Mrs. Emily Gay.

Mrs. Emily L. Day, wife of Rev. Hiram Day, of Glencoe, passed away at an early hour Thursday morning, 28th inst., after an illness in which she bore acute suffering with great fortitude and patience.

Emily Lincoln Foster was born at Petersham, Mass., nearly eighty-four years ago. She married Rev. Hiram Day, who had successive parishes at South Corwall, Windham, Stafford Springs, and North Manchester, Conn., North Bridge and Chatham, Mass., and Glencoe, Ill. Mr. Day survives her at the ripe age of eighty-eight. They had lived in Glencoe since 1880.

Mrs. Day leaves brothers and sisters as follows: Hon. J. B. Foster, Bangor, Me.; William Foster, Petersham, Mass.; Mrs. Orrin Tower, Pasadena, Cal. Mrs. John A. Rice, now at Bangor. They buried three children in early life, the only surviving child being Arthur H. Day, of Glencoe.

In the Glencoe circle Mrs. Day was greatly beloved and filled a large place in the religious, social and intellectual life of the community. She was possessed of a fine intelligence and sprightly wit, and took an active and creditable part in the affairs of the Woman's Library Club of Glencoe, in which her interest was especially enlisted, and to which she made many valuable literary contributions. Though past fourscore years, she retained her faculties undimmed to the last. She enjoyed life, was keenly alive to all its interests, and was youthful in everything but years.

Miss Consuelo Glover of Charlottesville Va. died at the residence of Charles Shaw Wednesday morning, of consumption. She had been the cook in Mr. Shaw's family for nearly two years. Burial at Rose Hill Thursday.
