AGUINALDO has taken the oath. Several of our local statesmen will be doing the same with their accustomed facility next week as their life barges meander up Salt river.

We wonder if the Chicago detective who came out here to hunt up the "blind pig" has got the balance of his pay for his valuable services. The laborer is worthy of his hire.

We understand that City Marshal Dooley has secured a billiard table to engage his attention after he lays down his billy and star, those insignia of office. The great Watts once wrote something about idle hands securing employment.

Down in Vermont the veterans of a war which terminated five and thirty years ago are just getting their pensions. Here the veterans of our present administration manage to get their pensions as they go along, and that fact is one of the causes of our local "war."

We have had several spells of house repairing during the fourteen years of our residence in the Park and have learned several things. One is that it is vastly cheaper and much more agreeable to build than to repair. On the other hand there is no way you can secure so big a pile of first class dry kindling wood as by repairing and reconstructing your house. At the same time it is liable to make the "women folks" a bit cross.

Mayor Cobb's Circular.

Mr. Cobb has issued a circular to the voters exhibiting his economical administration. He first makes a statement of city taxation during the administrations of Messrs. Erskine, Fletcher, Evans and Cobb, intended to show that the rate was lower during Cobb's than any other except Mayor Evans' first term, when it was \$2.36, while Cobb's lowest was \$2.97. But that whole table is misleading, for it is not the rate of taxation but the assessed valuation and the money raised and expended and how it is expended. Expenses are higher some years than others. The assessed valuation is rapidly increasing and hence the rate should be lower.

Mayor Evans kept the bonded indebtedness of the city down to about \$1,500 and paid off some \$3,000 of bonds. Mr. Cobb has run it up to \$11,000, as he says, \$6,500 of that for new bridges, one down south and one up north. City hall has been improved, at a cost of \$625.00 the first estimate, when the work was ordered last summer; it actually cost somewhere about \$1,200, and still the building is not a foot larger than it was before, and will

soon have to be enlarged or torn down and a new one built.

Mayor Cobb boasts of his board of local improvements' work. Mentions Sheridan Road South, at a cost of \$22,500. Did not Messrs. Hamilton, Birch and the property owners do all the work of getting plans, specifications, etc., and Mr. Cobb and his associates simply O. K. them, as by law they were required to do? So of the Sheridan Road north. It was the property owners who had meetings by the dozen, planned, laid out the work, and when all was ready had the board O. K. their work. And how many times did that have to be done over because of the defects of Mayor Cobb's legal department of the city government?

The west side sewer was prepared in the same way by Messrs. McCaffrey and Evans and the board O. K'ed it. The water mains were built by special assessment and out of the surplus from our expensive water rates. Prospect and Laurel avenues have been improved by funds which were planned and raised, or partly raised, during Mayor Evans' administration.

Why did not Mayor Cobb give the name of every official whose salary has been raised and the amount of the increase. Also he says: "No fair-minded person can charge me with neglecting my duties as chief executive officer." How about the administration's management of the blind pig business, Mr. Mayor? Was Marshal Dooley "judiciously" enforcing the ordinances when he beat Mf. Aldridge with a club in the justice's court?
