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Mr. Obee's Bad Break.
 Ex-alderman W. J. Obee for some unexplained reason made a very serious assault on Olaf Lindblom on the latter's own premises. Mr. Obee's recent severe illness may have temporarily unbalanced him; it certainly is a charitable judgment to think so. The facts as nearly as we can learn them are as follows:

Some woman over there wanted a bushel or two of black earth for flowers and went to Mr. Lindblom's back yard for a wheelbarrow load, and while there Mr. Lindblom found her at work. He quietly told her to go home with that load but not take any more as he did not want his yard dug up. Mr. Obee, who lives across the street, saw or heard the interview; at all events he was soon over there and in loud tones talked pretty roughly to Mr. Lindblom and drawing his revolver, thrust it into Mr. Lindblom's face, telling him he would shoot his head off or blow out his brains. Mr. Lindblom got away in some manner and into his house.

Mr. Obee went home, got his shotgun or rifle and sat on his back steps pointing the gun at Mr. Lindblom's front window and apparently watching for him to appear. When Mr. Obee pointed his revolver at Mr. Lindblom's face, Mrs. L. was looking out of the window and at once fell to the floor in a swoon. Mr. Lindblom says Mr. Obee was very violent in his abusive and threatening language and very much excited through it all. Several persons witnessed it.

Of course it was a very serious matter as well as a very sad one. It is a reproach to the city and we deeply regret it. Some legal measures of course will be taken, though just what we do not know. We may add that there has been some bad blood between the two men for some time, and Mr. Lindblom was very

active all day Tuesday getting voters to the polls, which very likely was too much for Mr. Obee's nerves, weakened by sickness. Mr. Lindblom bears the name of being a well behaved orderly citizen, but one who will defend himself and his rights. Mr. Obee is very high tempered, somewhat overbearing and dictatorial in his conduct.

A Massachusetts Idea.
