**Town Board**  
 The town officials, this Messrs. McDonald, Watson, Brier, Prior and Hibbard met last Friday evening and settled some questions for Assessor Brand. That his pay should be \$3.00 a day, his assistant, Orson B. Brand, the same and his clerk \$2.50, and eight hours be considered a day's work. In the discussion it came out assessor Brand's entire bill last year for all the work was \$2,250, while the year before Mr. Palmatier's, with his two deputies Messrs. Dooly and Basyette, billed up to \$578.50, or the Palmatier bill was \$280.25 in excess of Mr. Brand's with his assistant clerk etc.

True Mr. Palmatier had more work to do, but we guess there was some work for "that there was in it," that was the fashion during the regime of the "economical curse" administrations.

**Wisely Done.**  
 Our Lake Forest University may be a little "one hoss" affair beside the great Chicago octopus founded by John I. Rockefeller, but when the great university at Palo Alto, California, want an expert for a year to tide over matters while their man is in Europe, they come to Lake Forest for that man in the person of Dean John J. Halsey. This one act goes far to reinstate that Pacific coast school in the confidence of the public.

Dr. Halsey is a giant in his line, and he can put his Atlantean shoulders under the whole educational work of the coast and give it a mighty uplift somewhat akin to that prehistoric geological force which shaped new mountains and valleys. The "small college" is still in evidence, like some small states we wot of, and they may outlive some whose greatness is on every tongue to-day. We congratulate Dr. Halsey on his magnificent opportunity.

**An Error Corrected.**  
 The Waukegan Sun of Wednesday this week had an article in which it compared the expense of operating the waterworks plant in that city and in Highland Park which is wholly misleading, as well as very inaccurate. The writer of the article did very much as farmers in the olden times used to do when weighing pork and beef and other commodities. They would balance a plank over a log, something like a children's "teeter"; then place the quarter of beef or side of pork on one end of the plank and pile stones on the other end till it was balanced again, and then guess at the weight of the stones!

Now, the Sun writer saw some figures in City Clerk Finney's report and jumped to the conclusion that this city's waterworks were run at a loss. As a matter of fact, our waterworks are run at a handsome profit, and what to do with the surplus was one of the constant problems of the old "wise and economical" administration. Hence their scheme of a filter bed; their raise in the superintendent's salary, and sundry other things.

Mr. Finney groups all the receipts of the department at \$7,895; not \$8,482, as the Sun says. That includes sewer and dog licenses, sales of old planks and fines paid over by Judge Hibbard. The old council, the Sun's special friends, allowed Judge Dooley to retain enough of his to cover his costs in city cases.

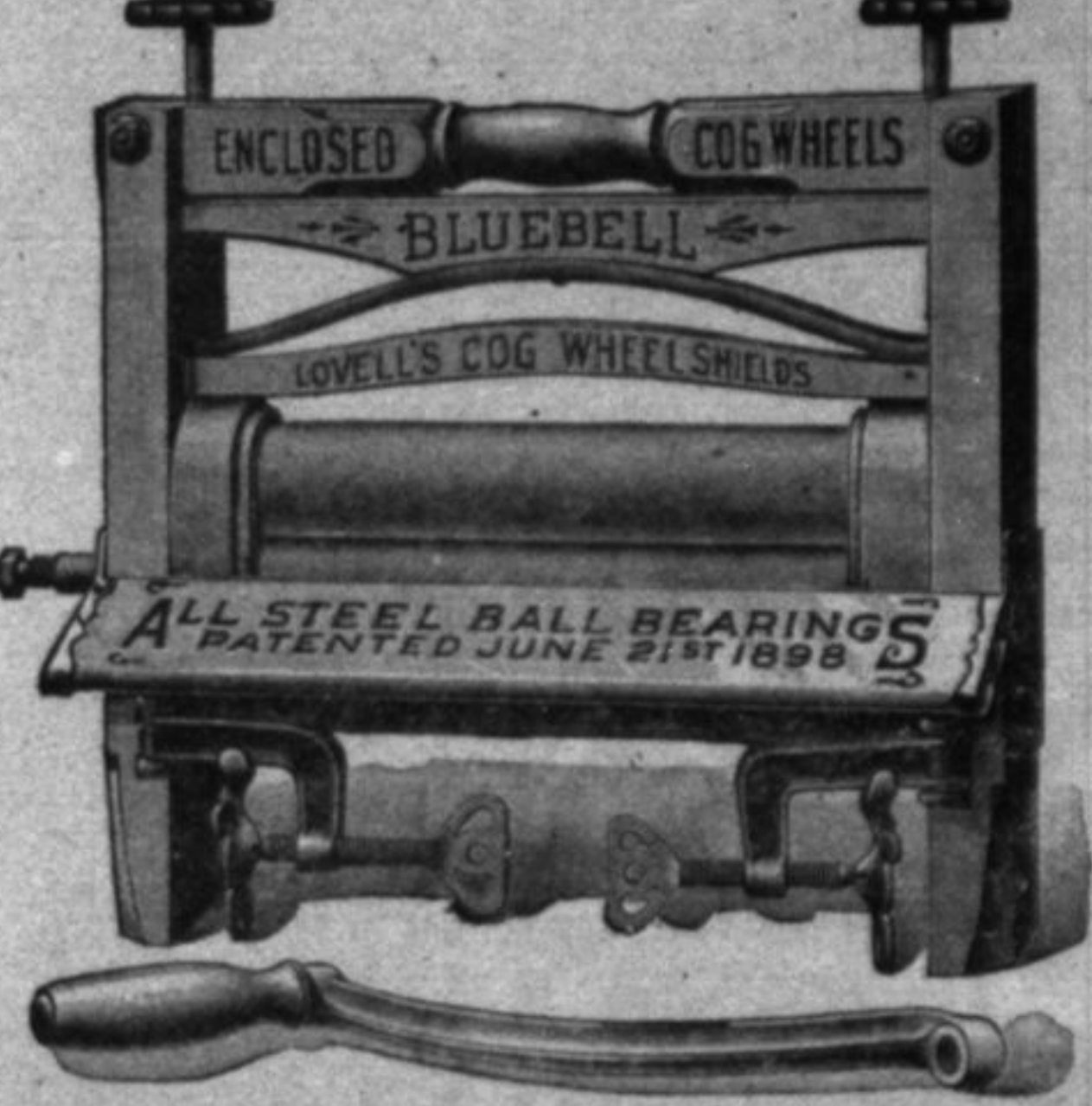
Mr. Finney also groups the total disbursements of the water department as \$9,845. There is where the Sun man guesses at the weight of the stones. Instead of looking at Mr. Finney's report to see what was included in that list of disbursements, he jumps to the conclusion that it was all operating expenses, and says Waukegan beats Highland Park "all hollow." Now, what does that list of disbursements include? Besides the regular, fixed operating expenses, which were too high, there were the following, to wit:  
 Repairing intake \$1,494  
 Repairing smoke stack 125  
 New condenser 533  
 New meters and repairs 590  
 Extensions of water mains 2,014  
 Filter bed pamphlets 64  
 Total \$2,826

There were other items outside of operating expenses enough to make up a clear \$3,000.  
 It costs too much to operate our water plant. There has been too much politics in it and too little "wisdom and economy" for the last two or three years. The rates are too high and should be reduced. But more of this later on.
