**Just Suppose**

You wish to know why we advocate delay in having the electric road pave between the tracks just at present. First of all because the public will not long tolerate St. Johns south of Laurel, as it is now. The parkway is pretty and beautiful and all right in itself, but like the diamond of Scripture, it is a "jewel of gold in a swine's snout," excellent in itself, but wholly out of place. We like parkways in their proper place, like that in Central east which we first suggested, after the beautiful Commonwealth avenue in Boston, and we like it still; shall like it better as the years go by.

But the public does not want that side parkway in St. Johns for two reasons, first it does not look well, no matter how finely kept or beautiful it is made, it is out of place. Second, it is such a palpable injury to the street, crowding it off to one side and only about half a street at that. The public demands a good broad street here and sooner or later will have it. That is as sure as tomorrow's sun rising. Now don't deceive yourself on that point, for that parkway will be cleaned out and the street macadamized up to the electric railway tracks. It may not come in one year, it may not come in five, it may not come in ten years, but it is coming.

Now then the electric folks don't want the heavy teaming thrown upon their tracks, supposing it can be done, which is more than an open question, for having granted them a right of way, we cannot by subsequent ordinance obstruct the passage of their cars. Then there is the question of danger to life and property. But all aside, the railway folks don't want it. Now just suppose it would cost the road \$3,000 to pave their tracks properly, would they not prefer giving that money to the city towards paving St. Johns properly, to spending it paving where they don't want any paving.

Hence we say go slow on compelling them to pave their roadbed; that \$3,000 toward putting

St. Johns right is not to "sneeze" as of no moment. It don't pay for either the city or the railway folks to get their mad up over a matter like this. The city is in the hole, and our problem is to get out the best, cheapest, wisest and safest way possible. Hence again we say go slow on that paving of the railway tracks.
