CITY COUNCIL.

Tuesday night was the regular session and all were present except Mr. Clappitt, the erudite alderman of the Second ward. The session also began on time and closed at 10 o'clock, after which the local board had a brief session. The bills passed July 2, for June expenses, amounted to \$1,621.25. The first item of business was the resignation of Hose Co. No. 2, which was referred to the fire marshal. Alderman Roberts suggested that the resignation be accepted and the apparatus turned over to the Railroad Men's Home who are anxious to form a company. Why not? Letters from J. W. Mauck and others of the Hillsdale College association were read thanking the council for the use of Park for their picnic.

J. McGregor Adams sent in a letter informing the council he should expect extra pay for the extra cash expense of putting in catch basins, etc., on St. Johns avenue on account of the Electric railway tracks.

Superintendent Nevins had another of his brief, terse reports of the work done during the month of July, from which it was clear that the grass did not grow yellow under his feet that month. Superintendent Ingalls had a complete report of the water plant for three months. See report elsewhere.

Central avenue, west of the city building to the limits, will soon have two classes of improvements. First, a special sewer to take care of the surface or storm water of Central avenue and the side streets which debouch into it. That will be the first, and the contract for it goes to Mr. McNeil, who by the way is becoming one of the leading contractors of the city for such work. The bids for the job were as follows:

The second improvement is for the grading and macadamizing of that street at an estimated cost of \$6283.15, and what that extra 15 cents is for we don't know unless for a couple of sodas at Sweetlands.

The street and alley committee reported that their work on the Vine avenue viaduct was completed at a total cost for renewal of dirt, according to contract with the Northwestern, at an expense of \$600 more than they expected but the cheapest they could get it done, as the city contracted to remove so many cubic yards. The city also pays the railroad company \$1200 toward the expense of the viaduct to the city, \$1800, only a small part of the total cost as it will be a first class job. The gas main ordinance on Walker and other avenues up north, was passed, also an order rebating certain water meter taxes.

The matter of shooting dogs came up on a bill of \$6 for shooting a dozen "cussed" curs. Warren and Brand opposed paying such a price. Roberts thought better hold up the shooting, but the bill was ordered paid. Why not get up a shooting match and kill the canines, or sell the live "critters" to the highest bidder for sausages. There are lots of ways of saving that fifty cents each on the dead dogs.

The matter of sidewalks came

up, on a letter from the clerk about some built a year ago, and Mr. Smoot said if the court decides that the walks are not built according to specifications in all respects and in every minute particular, the contractor loses his pay, the city is not liable at all, and the validity of the warrants for sidewalk construction depends almost wholly on whether the contractor does an honest job, exactly according to specifications. He went into the matter fully and showed that the contractor, or the holders of sidewalk paper can't collect a cent if the contractor fails in any one or more particulars. Hence the duty of property owners to watch walks carefully and then report to the court when the assessment comes on for approval.

Messrs. Heintz and Lindstrom asked to have the sidewalk ordinance against their lots on the south side of Elm Place west repealed and Moses and Brand favored it. Mr. Everett urged the walk strongly so the west side school children could go across the tracks on the south side and not be liable to be run over by the electric cars at the light house corner. The walk will be built.
