STATE SPECIALS.

**MOUNT CARMEL, Ill., Aug. 23.**—(Special Correspondence.)—This county has been greatly stirred up by Supt. Wright. Wonderful meetings have been held at points where no prohibition doctrine has been heard for several years. The meetings have been very satisfactory and productive of encouraging results. Mr. Wright will canvass Lawrence county next week.

**MT. STERLING, Ill., Aug. 24.**—(Special Correspondence.)—Supt. Charles E. Sparks has been shaking up Brown county, and the county officers are delighted with what has been accomplished, strengthening the prohibition cause. This is missionary territory, but it is thought the returns are good for the efforts made. Several more meetings will be held and at the close Mr. Sparks will retire from district work as he expects to enter a theological seminary next month. People in this district will be sorry to lose him.

**MACOMB, Ill., Aug. 2.**—(Special Correspondence.)—Several good meetings were held this week in the out town of the county. Country districts were invaded and the success has been gratifying. Supt. Bruber made strong addresses, stimulating prohibition and strengthening the organizations wherever he went. Next week will be spent in Adams and then a week in Hancock. He will commence work in Rock Island county September 3. The Meneleys will be in this section soon. They give a concert at September 3 and at Champaign, September 4.

**FLORA, Ill., Aug. 24.**—(Special Correspondence.)—The best series of meetings held in this county for several years came off last week. Supt. John G. Iliff and

**JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Aug. 24.**—(Special Correspondence.)—The prohibitionists of Jacksonville have possession of the city where they have provided one thousand seats to accommodate the people who gather every night to hear Captain Hofstittler. These are the greatest meetings held in Jacksonville for several years, and it is hoped that Captain Hofstittler will remain for another week. Many converts are being made. At Greenville he organized a club of ninety-three members. Mason City will be bombarded commencing September 1.

**GRAYSLAKE, Ill., Aug. 24.**—(Special Correspondence.)—The Lake county picnic billed for last Thursday was rained out. It was very wet all day. The faithful ones who gathered held a conference in the Congregational church. It was addressed by State Secretary Wilson and Supt. Dean spoke at night. It was decided to have the county picnic here September 14. The Meneleys have been engaged for the occasion.

The Klaw & Erlanger production of General Lew Wallace's "Ben Hur" will open the second season of the Illinois Theatre, Chicago, on Monday evening, September 2. Twelve carloads of scenery, machinery, equipment and accessories are now in the theatre. The production is so big that accommodations for several of the departments have been secured in an adjoining building, rented for the purpose, while a mammoth structure 60 feet long and 40 feet high has been erected of iron in the rear of the Illinois for the scenery not in use at the time that the performances are going on. There will be 350 people on the stage during the great scenes of "Ben Hur." The chariot race will show three charioteers, each driving four horses, running at full speed in view of the audience. The beholder will witness the entire race. This is accomplished by the use of a most intricate and ingenious bit of stage mechanism, in which the event of the smashing of Messala's wheel by the superior horsemanship of Ben Hur is distinctly shown. Three camels are used in other portions of the play, notably in the scene depicting the Star of Bethlehem and the adoration of the Greek, the Hindoo and the Egyptian, the Three Wise Men of the Holy Scriptures. All of the great incidents of General Wallace's immortal book will be shown on the stage of the Illinois during the run of "Ben Hur," with the exception of the Crucifixion, which cannot find a proper representation on the walls of any theatre. Hundreds of mail orders are being received daily for the first three weeks' performances, and these are being filled in their regular order. The regular box-office sale of seats will begin on Thursday morning, August 29, at the Illinois Theatre.



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
