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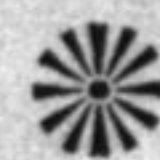

M. LE COL. BRYAN.

We have always felt there was some dark mystery that was part of the life of William Jennings Bryan, the peerless leader of the silver hosts.
Our conjectures have at last been vindicated. We hasten to place the story before our readers:
In a paper published in the south of France is found an amusing account of the early life and exploits of Colonel Bryan. The story, it appears, was written by the Paris correspondent of the provincial paper and is based, so the writer avers, on information furnished by friends of the candidate who have been prominent at the French capital.

In the effort to partially neutralize the strength of M. le Colonel among the cowboys and Indians who make up the largest majority of the voting population west of the Allegheny mountains, the republicans have nominated M. le Roosevelt for vice president.
