NOTICE FOR LETTING CONTRACT.

Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for grading, draining, paving with macadam and otherwise improving of Central avenue in the City of Highland Park, from its intersection with the east line of Green street, thence west to the westerly city limits of said city as a whole in accordance with the ordinance thereof. Said bids will be opened on the 8th day of October, A. D. 1901, at the hour of 8 p. m. at the office of the Board of Local Improvements, in city building.

The specifications for such improvement and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the City Clerk, in the city hall.

The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of Five (5) percent per annum.

All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check payable to the order of the President of the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park for a sum not less than 10 per centum of the aggregate of the proposal. Said proposals or bids must be delivered to the President of the Board of Local Improvements in open session of said board at the time and place fixed herein for opening the same. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a check as herein provided.

The Board of Local Improvements reserves the right to reject any or all bids should they deem it best for the public good.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a bond equal to Twenty-five (25) per centum of the contract price of some approved surety company guaranteeing said improvement against defects arising from poor material or poor workmanship for a period of five years from the date of the completion and acceptance thereof.
