The dead bodies of A. P. Wilcox and of Ex-Postmaste, wife and their 2-year-old son were found in their home at Downey, 12 miles from Los Angeles, Cal. All the bodies were horribly mutilated, and the bloody condition of the premises indicated that the murderer or murderers met with a fierce resistance.
