**LAKE FOREST'S CHURCH.**  
 E. P. Strandberg & Co., Chicago, were awarded the contract for the erection of the new Episcopal church at Lake Forest, which is to be of stone and brick and will cost \$18,000. Work is to be begun at once. The architects are J. C. Granger, of Chicago. In respects it resembles the Presbyterian church, but the plans show it is not so large. The opposition to the plan for erecting the new church has been overcome by the Rev. F. M. Barkdall, who has had charge of the Episcopal mission at Lake Forest.

**LAKE COUNTY'S POULTRY ASSOCIATION.**

The Lake County Poultry and Pet Stock Association held a meeting Wednesday, November 22, at Grays Lake, where plans were laid for the first annual poultry exhibit under the auspices of the association, to be held in the town hall at Grays Lake, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, December 10, 11 and 12. John S. Cleveland, of Fox Lake, is the president, and William Emmons, of Grays Lake, secretary; Frank Proctor, also of Grays Lake, was elected general superintendent of the show, and E. Walker, of Decatur, Mich., an authority on poultry breeding, was engaged as judge of entries. The premium list announces generous cash prizes to be given to exhibitors.

It will be the aim of the association to interest all breeders of poultry in Lake county as far as possible. Entries will close December 10, which can be made by corresponding with the president or secretary. Entries are not limited to county residents. It is expected that some of the finest entries will be from neighboring counties.

The organization of this association was made in April, 1901. The directors, besides those above mentioned are C. Lordy, M. A. Kapple, William Doolittle, George Hudson and Harry Price. Mrs. Bairstrow, of Grays Lake, is vice president and Mrs. Walter Shute, is treasurer.

The Academy had a pleasant surprise last Saturday in the shape of a visit from Lieut. W. S. Dean, N. M. A. '94. Lieut. Dean is now first lieutenant 15th Cavalry U. S. A. and has just returned from the Philippines.

On last Wednesday afternoon the Cadet team met the Lake Forest University foot ball team and were defeated by a score of 21 to 0. The Varsity team were much heavier and quicker than the cadets and should have made a larger score but the cadets were plucky and held them down. In the first half neither side was able to score, but in the second half the cadets tired under the rushes of their opponents and allowed the latter to make four touch downs. The Varsity showed a lamentable weakness in goal kicking, missing three out of four goals with the ball directly in front of the goal posts.

The last foot ball game of the season was played last Saturday afternoon and the cadets closed

the season in fitting manner by defeating Stearn's Academy by the score of 23 to 0. The cadet team this year has had a hard time on the account of parental objection but notwithstanding the fact, that as soon as the team would get into good shape some would be compelled to drop out, the boys have made a good showing. Of eleven games played they have won only four games, defeating Rugby, Princeton-Yale, Chicago, Latin and Stearns. They have been defeated by Lake View, Battery D, Evanston H. S., South Side, Waukegan H. S. and Lake Forest University. Their opponents have made a total score of 112 while the cadets though beaten in the majority of their games made a score of 142. Much credit for the successful showing of the team, is due to Coach Hunter and Captain Bissell both of whom have worked in spite of the discouragements.
