This means that we should require a more thorough system of inspection abroad and a more rigid

The second object of a proper immigraion law ought to he to secure by a careful and not merely perfunctory educational test some intelligent capacity to appreciate American institutions and act sanely as American citizens. This would not keep out all anarchists, for many of them belong to the intelligent criminal class.
