According to a ruling of the post-office department, all publications going through the mail must be free from advertising schemes on the lottery order. A strict observance of this has recently been ordered from Washington after notices of such as guessing, drawing, grabbing or other contests involving an element of chance cannot be published in a newspaper. Even the result of a contest is forbidden. This applies to business schemes and church drawing contests with equal severity. Advertising on folder or hand bills, which may be distributed by carrier, is the only means to be employed in reaching the public.
